4. The following is a summary of the educational background, qualifications, and experience of the Dean and each member of the faculty:

Roger J. Magnuson, Dean: Dean Magnuson is a graduate of Stanford University (B.A. 1967), Harvard Law School (J.D. 1971), and Oxford University (L.L.B. 1972). He is admitted to practice law in Minnesota and is a senior partner in the firm Dorsey & Whitney.

Tracy W. Banks, Professor: Professor Banks is a graduate of Rice University (B.A. 1987) and the College of Law and Government at Regent University (J.D. 1990). She is admitted to practice law in Virginia and has taught Legal Research and Writing at Regent University Law School.

Robert J. Barth, Professor: Professor Barth is a graduate of the University of Illinois (B.S. 1976), Southern Illinois University Law School (J.D. 1979), and the School of Public Policy at Regent University (M.A. 1986). He has taught at Regent University where he was also Assistant Dean for Academic and Student Affairs. He currently practices law as General Counsel for the Institute in Basic Life Principles. Professor Barth is admitted to practice law in Virginia and Illinois.

Robert G. Caprera, Professor: Professor Caprera is a graduate of Duke University (B.A. 1976) and Nova University Law School (J.D. 1979). He is a member of the Massachusetts and Florida Bars, and is engaged in private practice.

Jordan W. Lorence, Professor: Professor Lorence is a graduate of Stanford University (B.A. 1977) and University of Minnesota Law School (J.D. 1980). He is admitted to practice law in Virginia, Minnesota, and the District of Columbia, and is litigation attorney for the Alliance Defense Fund.

Eric K. Rucker, Professor: Professor Rucker is a graduate of Kansas Wesleyan College (B.A. 1976), Emporia State University (M.S. 1976), and Washburn School of Law (J.D. 1981). He has held public office in various positions in the state of Kansas.

Michael G. Tapp, Professor: Professor Tapp is a graduate of the University of Houston (B.S. 1974), and South Texas College of Law (J.D. 1979). He has been practicing law since 1978, and is admitted to practice law in the state of Texas.

Russell E. Templeton, Professor: Professor Templeton is a graduate of the University of California at Santa Barbara (B.A. 1968) and the University of California at Davis (J.D. 1971). He is admitted to practice law in California where he has been engaged in private practice since 1971.

Douglas McElvy, Professor: Professor McElvy is a graduate of the University of Alabama where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Commerce and Business Administration with a major in Accounting in 1967. He received his Juris Doctor in 1971 from the University of Alabama. He is admitted to practice law in Alabama, U.S. Federal Courts, and the U.S. Supreme Court.

Larry Higgins, Professor: Professor Higgins is a graduate of the University of Notre Dame (B.A. 1975) and Hamline University College of Law (J.D. 1980). He is admitted to practice law in Minnesota.

David J. Siegrist, Professor: Professor Siegrist is a graduate of the University of Illinois (B.S. 1978) and Drake University (J.D. 1981). He is admitted to practice law in Iowa, where he is currently engaged in private practice.

Valarie L. Wallin, Professor: Professor Wallin is a graduate of Oak Brook College of Law (J.D. 2001). She is admitted to practice law in California and Wisconsin.

Sean J. Gallagher, Professor: Professor Gallagher is a graduate of Oak Brook College of Law (J.D. 1999). He is admitted to practice law in California.

Peter L. Fear, Professor: Professor Fear is a graduate of Oak Brook College of Law (J.D. 1999). He is admitted to practice law in California, where he is currently engaged in private practice.

John Eidsmoe, Professor: Professor Eidsmoe is a graduate of St. Olaf College with a B.A. in political science, the University of Iowa College of Law with a Juris Doctor, Lutheran Brethren Seminary with a Master of Divinity, Dallas Theological Seminary with a Master of Arts in Biblical Studies, Oral Roberts University with a Doctor of Ministries, and an Honorary Doctor of Laws from the Thomas Goode Jones School of Law. He is also a graduate of the Air Command & Staff College and the Air War College. He is a retired Air Force Judge Advocate and Lt. Colonel, an ordained pastor with the Association of Free Lutheran Congregations, admitted to the practice of law in Iowa, and is currently serving as Legal Counsel for the Foundation of Moral Law.

Emily A. Younger, Professor: Professor Younger is a graduate of Oak Brook College of Law (J.D. 2004). She is admitted to practice law in California.

William Humble III, Professor: Professor Humble is a graduate of Oak Brook College of Law (J.D. 2001). He is admitted to practice law in California.

7. Oak Brook College of Law has not been issued a Notice of Noncompliance by the Committee of Bar Examiners.

8. The method of instruction at this law school for the Juris Doctor (J.D.) degree program is principally by correspondence.

Students enrolled in the J.D. degree program at this law school who successfully complete the first year of law study must pass the First-Year Law Students' Examination required by Business and Professions Code §6060(h) and Title 4, Division 1, Chapter 5, of the *Rules of the State Bar of California* (Admission Rules) as part of the requirements to qualify to take the California Bar Examination. A student who passes the First-Year Law Students' Examination within three (3) administrations of the examination after first becoming eligible to take it will receive credit for all legal studies completed to the time the examination is passed. A student who does not pass the examination within three (3) administrations of the examination after first becoming eligible to take it must be promptly disqualified from the law school's J.D. degree program. If the dismissed student subsequently passes the examination, the student is eligible for re-enrollment in this law school's J.D. degree program, but will receive credit for only one year of legal study.

Study at, or graduation from, this school may not qualify a student to take the bar examination or to satisfy the requirements for admission to practice in jurisdictions other than California. A student intending to seek admission to practice law in a jurisdiction other than California should contact the admitting authority in that jurisdiction for information regarding the legal education requirements in that jurisdiction for admission to the practice of law.

This Disclosure statement must be provided to each prospective student upon payment of an application fee, but before payment of a registration fee, and to each new or returning student, prior to payment of any academic term. This disclosure must be signed by the enrolling student and the student shall receive a copy of the signed statement.
